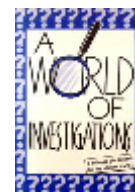

A World of Investigations

This pack offers practical activities to encourage an investigative approach to science. The pack shows how photographs can help children develop skills in generating questions, planning investigations and evaluating outcomes. The photographs show everyday life in different parts of the world, including Nepal, Bangladesh and Egypt. The images aim to provoke enquiry across the science curriculum including issues of **soil erosion, healthy living, growing food, use of materials and energy.**

Clean Water - A Right For All

An excellent, broadly based resource pack offering a global perspective on the fundamental importance of clean water. It includes a handbook with a wide range of photocopiable worksheets, 12 colour photographs and 10 information sheets. Aspects covered include water in daily life, water and health, water out of control, and pollution. There is a good range of activities, science experiments, design and technology tasks, and suggestions for role-play. Includes a useful assessment activity.

Global Communities: Learning about refugee issues (Primary)

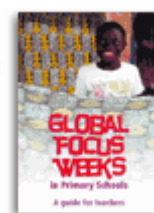

Go Bananas!

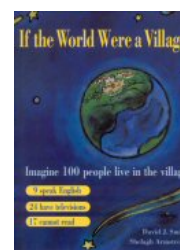
Go Bananas! A photopack for ages 5-11 about the journey of a banana from the Caribbean to the UK. This popular photopack follows the journey of a banana from the Caribbean to the UK. It's an engaging way for pupils to understand that food is produced overseas, to become familiar with the processes that follow, and to engage with issues of fair trade. Developed for a busy mixed-ability classroom, the activities are ideal for independent work, small groups and whole classes.

If the World Were a Village

With 6 billion people on the planet it's hard to get a perspective on the way we live, so this innovative book looks at the world as though it is a village of 100 people. The percentage distribution stays the same for nationality, languages, age, religion, food, schooling, literacy, money, and resources. Pupils will discover that 22 people in the village speak a Chinese dialect, 50 are often hungry and only 24 have televisions. Beautifully illustrated, this is a simple yet fascinating way to inspire children to take an interest in geography and citizenship.

India: Children's needs; children's rights

Follow the railway track round India, meeting new Indian friends, and finding out about their country as you go. This pack features a lively 'Journey through India' board game, colour photocards, and photocopiable teaching resources for children at a range of levels, and provides an overview of diverse lifestyles and locations in India. Links to the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child encourage pupils to consider how the rights of some children are being met much more effectively than others. Includes units on habitat, water and health, food and shopping, education and play, festivals and faiths, and history.

Learning Global Lessons: 50 non-fiction literacy hours

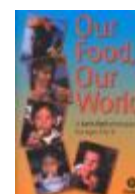

Our Food, Our World: (Let's Eat! Photopack for Ages 5 to 9)

Explore the worlds of five children and the food they eat! Our Street, Our World!

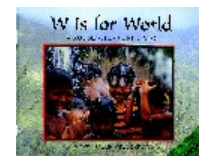

We are Britain

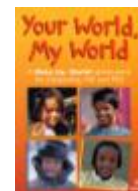
